For 33 years, our Monroe County community has shared and supported our vision: everyone deserves a decent place to live. The past year may have disrupted our normal way of life and traditional operations, but it allowed us to pave the road for success in the years ahead. Some highlights include:

Owens Corning Roof Deployment Project

This project is a nationwide effort to show gratitude and honor the veterans who served our country and the families who support them. For the second year, we partnered with veteran-owned RCV Roofing, Siding & Gutters to provide a roof replacement for Robert Livingston, a U.S. Army National Guard veteran, and his wife, Barbara.

Women Build 2020

While this wasn't the 20th anniversary build we expected, the Women Build community was still able to fully fund and build two homes in partnership with homeowners Mary and Keba -- *in the middle of a pandemic.* We are grateful for all who donated/raised funds, volunteered, and advocated for our mission. Women Build is so special, and we were shown again and again that **nothing can stop women on a mission**.



Osage Place Groundbreaking

We officially broke ground on our third neighborhood, Osage Place, in May 2021. Phase 1 includes the infrastructure work for 30 lots -- just under half of the proposed 69 lots for homes to be built in Osage Place over the next several years. This part of the project is funded by a combination of public and private support, including generous gifts from Sherman and Meredith Rogers and Bloom Insurance Agency, as well as City of Bloomington funding, a land contribution from the Monroe County Commissioners, and leveraged use of funding from our mortgages. Despite supply-chain delays and material shortages, construction on the first three homes began in fall of 2021.

every family needs a strong foundation to build the future

When the pandemic struck in 2020, we shifted our focus from building houses to keeping families housed. We contacted all of our mortgage-holding families to check on them. Many of them reported a change to their income - reduced hours and decreased pay, or they had been laid off entirely.

We were able to offer forbearance to any family negatively impacted by COVID-19. Twelve families (nearly 10% of mortgage holders) were offered a 3-month forbearance, and some extended it to a 6-month period. At the end of that time, **every family** had resumed payments, and **all but one** had caught up on the previous payments. Habitat families are **resilient**.

Thanks to grant funding, we were able to purchase Chromebooks to allow families to continue their homeowner education classes online.

every helping hand makes a difference

After implementing several safety measures and following local health guidelines, we welcomed our crew leaders back to the build site in June 2020. Crew Leaders are a special group of skilled construction volunteers. They are typically joined by weekly community volunteer groups, but primarily worked on their own over the last year.

These hardworking men and women helped the Habitat construction team finish three new construction builds and one recycled home - **helping house 14 people, including eight children.** These 40 crew leaders represented 80% of our affiliate's total annual volunteer hours last year. We truly could not serve our future homeowners without their help!













every door opens a new opportunity

As material and construction costs continue to rise, Habitat is dedicated to finding innovative ways to make homeownership more accessible to more people.

In July 2020, we launched the Container Home Pilot Project, working to turn a recycled shipping container into an affordable housing opportunity. While not an entirely new concept, this is the **first Habitat effort of its kind in Indiana**.

The project was born through a Kelley Institute for Social Impact's Case Competition in early 2019. The winning team of students developed a plan, and the idea was supported through an award of \$10,000. This build is also largely funded by a generous grant of \$41,420 through the Community Foundation of Bloomington and Monroe County's Community Impact Grant program.

With lower construction costs (and, in turn, mortgage payments) than traditional homes, this pilot project could allow us to provide a long-term housing solution that is especially beneficial to lower- and fixed-income households.

EVERY VOICE can advocate and help families build strength, stability and independence

The financial support, voice and time of our local donors and volunteers are changing the lives of families right here in Bloomington.

In 2020, a group of avid cyclists led by Blayne Roeder and Taylor Allen saw the impact of the pandemic on local nonprofits and decided to act. "Everesting for Habitat" came together to raise awareness and funds in support of Habitat by biking the height of Mount Everest - 29,029 feet - and fundraising one dollar per foot climbed. The original pair of riders grew to five as they increased their goal to \$40,000 and completed **three Everesting events to surpass their goal.**
