TITLE: Future Homeowner Budget Partners

POSITION VISION AND SUMMARY:

Budget Partners are paired with future Habitat homeowner families to provide ongoing support and coaching to be successful with their personal budgets. All adults in the future homeowner household must complete a defined course curriculum that includes a series of six Money Management courses, as well as several supplemental financial literacy classes. Partners will reinforce the topics taught in these classes by meeting once per month with their assigned family to help with their personal budget and any assignments from class. It is not expected for partners to attend classes with their family, and course materials will be provided to you for consistency.

Budget Partners do not need to be financial experts, but should be able to demonstrate knowledge and experience in maintaining personal finances. Most importantly, partners serve as coaches – asking questions when things don't add up and checking on the progress of class assignments. Many Habitat future homeowners will be first-generation homeowners, and Habitat is determined to set families up for success by preparing them for the realities of homeownership and additional financial responsibility.

A mandatory training session will be held prior to your assignment to a family (or *families* if chosen). This is a voluntary position with the commitment of meeting **monthly** with your assigned family/families from the start of their Money Management series until they move into their home (typically 9-12 months, with some exceptions).

DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

- Provide financial literacy support and coaching to assigned future homeowner family/families for the entirety of their time in the Habitat homeownership program
- Work with future homeowners to set SMART (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and timebased) goals related to their personal finances and hold them accountable
- Maintain open communication with Homeowner Services Director regarding future homeowner progress, participation, and any notable changes in family circumstances
- Provide families with support through challenges, and help celebrate successes and milestones, such as attending home dedications

KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, AND ABILITIES:

- An interest in affordable housing and first-time homeowner preparedness
- A knowledge and experience in personal financial literacy
- Excellent interpersonal and cross-cultural skills to effectively work with a broad range of people
- Excellent communication skills
- Basic computer skills, including Microsoft Excel / Google Sheets
- Ability to maintain strict client confidentiality
- Must be willing to undergo a background check
- Bilingual and/or fluent Spanish-speakers strongly needed
